



Hiking Trail: Cimarron Canyon State Park

Cimarron Canyon State Park is three miles east of Eagle Nest along US Hwy. 64. There is a \$5 per vehicle day use fee. A \$40 annual pass is available which is valid in all NM State Parks. Hikers and fishermen with vehicles will be required to have a valid pass or pay the \$5 fee.

Clear Creek trail is one of the most popular of the many hiking trails in the canyon. The rail is seven miles round trip and is easy to follow. Elevation rises 1,000 feet from the canyon floor. The overall hike takes approximately three hours. You'll find a place to park at mile marker 292 on US Hwy. 64, with the trailhead just on the other side of the log with water running through it.

Tolby trails have a beginning elevation of 8,200 feet with the highest elevation at 9,620 feet. Round trip to Tolby Meadows is 10.9 miles. Access to the trailhead is on US Hwy 64, across the highway from the Tolby Day Use Area and Tolby Creek Campground. Tolby trails are closed Many 15 through July 31 each year for elk calving season. This is a system of trails known as Lower Tolby trail, which begins at the trailhead, Upper Tolby trail, which begins 1,000 feet up Lower Tolby trail on the left, and Tolby Meadows trail, a side trail that is just three miles out and back.

Maverick Canyon trail is a 10 mile round trip following old logging roads. This is a scenic area with excellent wildlife viewing opportunities. The main trail leads to Touch-Me-Not and Green Mountains.

Jasper and Agate trails begin at mile marker 293 on US Hwy. 64. The trail is four miles round trip following old logging roads.



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
